SPLOST:

BUILDING A BETTER SAVANNAH


The Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax has been one of the greatest community development tools in the history of municipal government. Almost 40% of the sales tax is paid for by visitors to our community, but all of the proceeds directly benefit the citizens of Chatham County, funding critical projects without relying on property taxes.

SPLOST has funded more than \$1 billion worth of projects in Chatham County since the first referendum in 1985, nearly \$400 million of which has been paid for by visitors who live outside the County. The City of Savannah's share has totaled \$342 million, almost half of which has been spent on drainage, which has dramatically improved living conditions in all areas of Savannah.

SPLOST has also paved hundreds of miles of roads and sidewalks, added new neighborhood parks, and created exciting projects that have led to hundreds of millions of dollars in private investment, such as the redevelopment of Ellis Square and the transformation of Savannah Gardens and Sustainable Fellwood.

This November, Chatham County voters will decide whether to renew SPLOST for a six-year period. We have carefully crafted a list of projects that both develop critical infrastructure while spurring economic development to help create jobs and further broaden the tax base.

We know this is a decision you do not take lightly. Neither do we. As you consider whether to renew the 1% sales tax, we offer a report card on how your City Government has managed its share of SPLOST through the years. Please note that critical SPLOST projects built by the County and other jurisdictions are not included in this publication. What is included are some City SPLOST highlights, as well as a comprehensive list of Savannah's SPLOST plan since 1985.



44% **DRAINAGE: \$149,411,494**

Project highlights include:



Montgomery Crossroad, DeRenne, Kayton & Westside Pump Stations - \$28.8 million

The Montgomery Crossroad, DeRenne, Kayton and Westside Pump Stations are major facilities that move stormwater down several major drainage canals while allowing drainage to occur during high tides, which previously was not possible.



Westside Drainage Improvements \$29 million

Projects on the westside included improvements in the Evergreen area, construction of a major stormwater interceptor on the westside, and an expansion of the Springfield Canal as well as other improvements in the Springfield Basin.



Casey South Drainage Project Phase I - \$21.5 million

The Casey South Drainage Project was the most extensive drainage improvement in Savannah's history, relieving chronic flooding in midtown Savannah, including Chatham Crescent, Ardsley Park and Olin Heights.



Southside Drainage Improvements \$15.1 million

Drainage improvements on the southside included dramatically improving the capacity of the Wilshire and Windsor canals, as well as expansion of drainage facilities in the Wilshire Basin and Paradise Park.

Projects in Progress

Three projects that have been allocated a total of \$37.1 million are currently in the design phase, with plans to begin construction in late 2013 and early 2014. The Habersham Village Drainage Project will improve drainage in the midtown areas of Habersham Street, Abercorn Street and Paulsen Street. Improvements to the Bilbo Box will improve drainage in a wide area of downtown's eastside. The Baldwin Park Drainage Project is focused on the streets around Baldwin Circle just north of Victory Drive.




PARKS: \$24,120,691

Project highlights include:



Savannah Children's Museum - \$6.5 million

Funds were used to stabilize and restore former Central of Georgia buildings at the Railroad Roundhouse to house the Savannah Children's Museum. Funds were also used to complete the first phase of the Museum, an exciting outdoor interactive play and discovery area called *Exploration Station*, which opened in 2012.



Neighborhood Parks - \$2 million

A number of neighborhood parks have been created with SPLOST, including Floyd "Pressboy" Adams Park in Cuyler-Brownville, the Habersham Woods Turtle Park, Rockwell Park on Victory Drive, and Joseph Tribble Park in Windsor Forest.



Bacon Park Recreation Facilities - \$2.5 million

The Bacon Park Tennis Facility underwent a complete court resurfacing and construction of a new tennis clubhouse. The Bacon Park Golf Course received a major renovation to the clubhouse, while nearby athletic fields were reconstructed.



Daffin Park/Grayson Stadium Restoration - \$7.5 million

Daffin Park, the largest park in Savannah, has undergone major improvements, including new jogging trails, lighting, and fields, while historic Grayson Stadium received a new field, roof over the grandstands, and bleachers.

Projects in Progress

- Coffee Bluff Marina :** The \$4.1 million project that is creating new docking and boat lift facilities, a fishing pier, as well as picnic and playground areas, is scheduled to open in February 2014. The City's purchase of the property preserved public access to the water, creating Savannah's first publicly owned marina.
- Cultural Arts Center - \$20.4 million:** Design is under way on a permanent home for the cultural arts in Savannah at Oglethorpe and Montgomery Streets. The Center will be a true community space, featuring much-needed performance, gallery, class and rehearsal space for the public.



STREETS: \$36,276,008

Project highlights include:



MLK Streetscape - \$3.7 million

The comprehensive 52-block streetscape plan was developed through an extensive public process. Improvements include refurbished medians, new brick sidewalks, ornamental lighting, and pedestrian crosswalks.

Projects in Progress

Waters Avenue Streetscape \$1.5 million

To support the ongoing revitalization efforts of this major corridor, the Waters Avenue streetscape plan includes the installation of ornamental lighting, brick sidewalks and pedestrian crosswalks.



PUBLIC SAFETY: \$27,737,505

Project highlights include:



Police Administrative Services and Training Building - \$10.8 million

The City is constructing two critical facilities for Police on a 9-acre site donated by the federal government off Mills B Lane Blvd. The Administrative Services Center opened in 2013, and houses the police department's budget office, administrative services division, quartermaster unit, gang unit, and the property and evidence room. A police training facility on the same property will begin construction in the fall.

Projects in Progress

The new \$1 million Fire Training Facility will replace aged, temporary facilities. All new firefighter recruits will complete their training at the facility. The facility, which includes a burn building, tower and natural gas props, will be used for live fire training, rope and high altitude rescue training, and a variety of required certifications such as pump, hose and ladder testing.



Thomas Square Fire Station - \$2.7 million

The two-story station, located at 33rd & Whitaker Streets, includes three bays for apparatus, an SCBA fill station for re-filling firefighters' air packs, and a decontamination room. It also has a multi-purpose room, office space, conference rooms, interview room and secure evidence storage. The second floor is the living quarters for the two dozen firefighters assigned to the station. It includes a dormitory, kitchen, bathrooms and shower facilities, and a computer room.



Public Safety Video Surveillance \$1.3 million

With 360-degree panning, extra-tight zooming and web-based monitoring from anywhere in the city, this network of surveillance cameras helps solve as well as deter crime in public areas throughout Savannah.



SIDEWALKS: \$5,352,776

Project highlights include:



Bay Street Reconstruction Crosswalk \$550,918


Bay Street is the main thoroughfare in the Historic District, carrying over 25,000 vehicles daily. The City installed stamped brick crosswalks and advance walk signals to allow pedestrians to begin crossing before vehicles are signaled and brick crosswalks at the signalized intersections. The pedestrian signal buttons were upgraded with audible prompts to provide greater accessibility to the blind and visually-impaired.



ADA Ramps \$426,857

Limited right-of-way, unique street-level architectural features and the concerns of careful stewardship of the Historic District, all contributed over time to limiting the accessibility of sidewalks in the area. To address this serious concern in the most comprehensive manner possible, over a two-year period the City installed 1,460 ramps making all sidewalks in the Historic District compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

FACILITIES: \$99,833,380

Project highlights include:



Battlefield Memorial/Georgia State Railroad Museum - \$11.3 million

This National Historic Landmark site is the oldest and largest existing nineteenth-century railroad operations complex in the nation. Construction began in 1850. Thirteen of the original structures remain today. The City worked with the Coastal Heritage Society to purchase, decontaminate & develop Battlefield Park, the site of an important Revolutionary War battle.



Savannah Gardens Phase I - \$11.2 million

A redevelopment of Strathmore Estates, a crime-ridden 44 acres of substandard housing along Pennsylvania Avenue. Savannah Gardens will include 550 units of mixed income, environmentally sustainable housing. Part I crimes have dropped 67% in the area since construction began.



Community Center Improvements

The Carver Heights Community Center (above top), and the Crusader Neighborhood Center (above bottom) were two of five neighborhood centers in the City that received more than \$4.2 million in SPLOST improvements.



Whitaker St. Garage / Ellis Square- \$12.1 million

The City demolished the City Market Parking Garage, doubled the amount of parking with the 1,100-space underground Whitaker St. Garage, and restored Ellis Square as a public space for the first time in 50 years. The project has spurred more than \$100 million in private investment in the immediate area.



Sustainable Fellwood Infrastructure \$3.7 million

The City of Savannah invested in the construction of new roadways, parks and an expanded water and sewer system in preparation for the construction of 110 environmentally-friendly, energy efficient housing units on the 27-acre former Fellwood Homes site.



Midtown Municipal Center \$2.4 million

The new Midtown Municipal Center offers a convenient, central Savannah location with on-site parking. The facility houses the 311 Call Center; the Citizens Office and Project DeRenne Resource Room; Coastal Workforce Services; the Youth Futures Authority; and Metro Police Internal Affairs.



Moses Jackson Advancement Center \$1.6 million

A multi-purpose training and development facility developed to help citizens improve their opportunities for employment and financial security through ongoing training and development. Programs and services are made available on-site through partnerships with multiple local educational institutions, business partners, and area nonprofits.



Forsyth Park Fort and Bandshell \$1.5 million

In 2009 the City renovated the long-vacant and deteriorating historic fort in Forsyth Park into a state-of-the-art visitors center and café complete with public bathrooms. An elevated performance stage and acoustic shell for outdoor concerts and performances was also included in the renovations.

A Closer Look at SPLOST

What is SPLOST?

The Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax is a voter-approved 1% tax on taxable goods in Chatham County that can only be used for certain kinds of construction expenses.

Is that the only sales tax we have?

SPLOST is 1% of an overall 7% sales tax in Chatham County. When you go to the store and purchase a \$1.00 soda, you pay 7 cents in sales tax. Of those 7 pennies, 4 pennies go to the State of Georgia. The remaining 3 pennies stay in Chatham County.

How are our 3 pennies divided?

Of those 3 pennies, the first penny goes to E-SPLOST, which is used by the school system for capital projects like new schools and technology. The second penny, called LOST, is divided amongst the County and 8 municipalities for general expenditures. The third penny is SPLOST, and is divided amongst the same jurisdictions for capital projects.

How is SPLOST divided?

As the County and Cities prepare to go to voters to ask them to renew SPLOST, they must decide how much each jurisdiction will receive. To do this, planners must make certain estimates about how much revenue the sales tax will generate during the six-year collection period.

What's in the current SPLOST plan?

SPLOST 5 was approved by voters in 2006 for a tax collection period from 2008-2014. The estimate at the time was the City of Savannah would receive \$160 million. The City proposed spending the money in 18 categories, including \$70 million to help pay for a new arena. While \$70 million was roughly half of the total amount needed for this facility, it was enough to begin property acquisition, planning and design. The remainder would come from future SPLOST or other funding sources.

What happened to that plan?

When the recession hit a few years later, it became clear that Chatham County would receive significantly less revenue than estimated. In 2010, City Council reduced its SPLOST 5 plan from \$160 million in projects to \$122 million to accommodate. There were no easy decisions. Council decided it was more important to complete critical infrastructure and public safety projects than maintain the \$70 million arena funding, which was still well short of the amount needed for construction.

Below are details of the City's SPLOST 5 plan, and the adjustments made in 2010:
