The City of Savannah is now accepting Social Services Grant Program applications for Fiscal Year 2017. Contributions approved by the Mayor and Aldermen will vary in amount and will be made in the form of a grant to non-profit agencies to purchase services that will be provided in the Savannah community. All funded programs must perform work which helps the City meet overall strategic priorities as defined by City Council. Those priorities include:

Eligibility and Funding Criteria

Eligible Applicants:

Organizations possessing the capacity and demonstrated ability to perform the scope of services contained in its application. Eligible organizations include:

- Not-for-profit agencies providing services directly benefitting citizens of the City of Savannah
- Not-for-profit agencies located in the City of Savannah

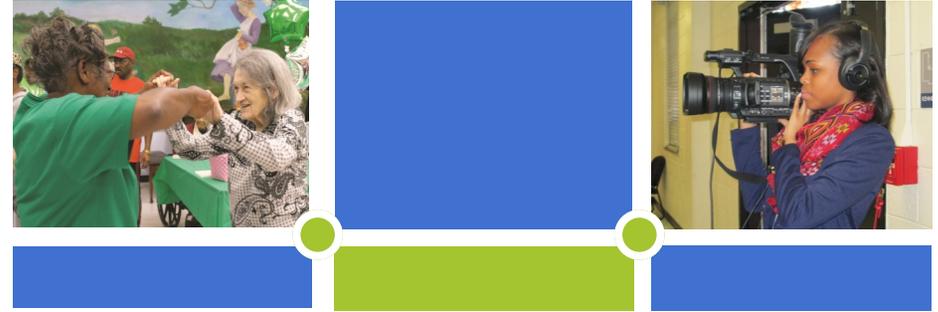
Funding Criteria:

- Agencies must clearly indicate proposed use of funds.
- Agencies must clearly define the budget for each program for which funding is requested, as well as provide an agency-wide budget showing the use of funding from all revenue sources.
- Agencies must meet all deadlines and requirements in order to be considered for SSGP funding.

Panel Review Process

A committee of City of Savannah employees that work closely with the public as well as outside agency employees familiar with community needs meets annually to review each application submitted for funding through the Social Services Grant Program. This committee evaluates each proposal based on 9 Key Indicators:

1. **Total Number of City Participants/Clients**
2. **Cost per Program Participant/Client**
3. **Diversity of Funding Sources**
4. **Documented Collaborations**
5. **Improved Quality of Life for Participants/Clients**
6. **Sustainability of Program**
7. **Ratio of Overhead to Budget**
8. **City-Wide Priorities**
9. **Coastal Georgia Indicators Coalition Community Needs Assessment**

Matching Funds

Matching funds are not required, but add additional points in project scoring when included as part of a program's funding. Matching funds may be cash, in-kind, or volunteer labor. Volunteer labor is valued at \$15/hour.
