


13—Ramparts of Historic Fort Pulaski, Showing Atlantic Ocean in Distance

Fort Pulaski, located off Highway U. S. 80, 17 miles from Savannah on road to Savannah Beach, Ga. The fort was named in honor of Count Casimir Pulaski, who was mortally wounded at the Battle of Savannah in 1779. Surrounded by a wide moat, it is 1,380 feet in circumference. The 7 to 11 feet thick solid brick walls were designed to mount two tiers of guns. A National Monument since 1924, it is open to visitors the year round.






**FORT PULASKI NATIONAL MONUMENT**


Fort Pulaski ended an era of Military Architecture characterized by massive brick construction when sections of the walls were pulverized by the rifled cannon.






